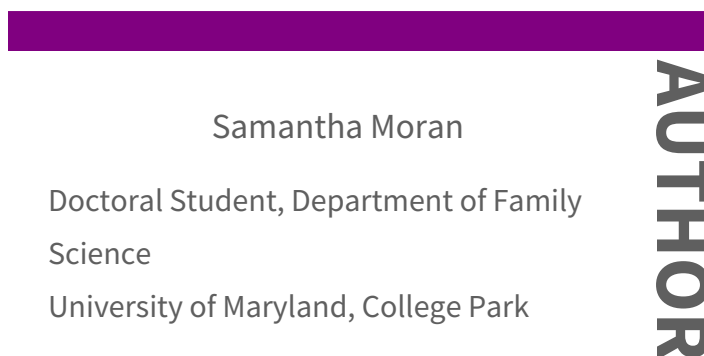


Member Spotlight: Samantha Moran

Why did you decide to choose developmental science as a course of study or career?

Early on I knew I wanted to work with children and young adults in some capacity in my career. I always saw myself in a school counselor/guidance counselor role. Though my career trajectory has shifted over the years from clinical to a more research driven path, the broader school environment has remained a core focus. My current graduate studies are grounded in a foundation that recognizes 1). how pivotal the developmental period between early childhood and early adulthood is, especially for sexual and gender minority (SGM) populations, and 2). how the school environment is centered in these developmental processes.

Is there a mentor or mentors who have been instrumental to your studies and career path so far, and, if so, who and how?

My Ph.D. advisor Dr. Jessica Fish has been instrumental to my success as a graduate student and early career researcher.
