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Welcome from the President

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New. New. New. SRCD has a new Headquarters - at 1825 K Street in Washington DC. SRCD has a new Executive Director, Dr. Laura L. Namy, a new structure, and many new staff to people it. In keeping, the 2019 SRCD Biennial has a new organization and offers a host of new attractions.

Welcome all to your new Society and your new Biennial meeting!

First, the Invited Program of this Biennial, planned by Jennifer E. Lansford, Silvia Koller, and myself, is firmly structured around three themes that are closely **tied to SRCD's** Strategic Plan. International Day presents research by developmental scholars from different countries that features understanding child development in multinational contexts. Interdisciplinary Day showcases research by developmental scholars working in a variety of disciplines from anthropology to economics to sociology. Relevant Day highlights how our developmental science is being applied to transform the lives of children around the world. Were you only to attend the 2019 Invited Program over these three days, you would come away from this Biennial with a refreshed appreciation of the deeply international, interdisciplinary, and relevant character of our work.

Second, each day around noon-time come hear a series of TADs -- Talks about Development. The three 15-minute TED-type presentations each day follow the plan of that day's Invited Program theme. These plenaries are unopposed in the day's schedule allowing all of us to convene in the same place at the same time. Grab 'n go light lunches will be available for purchase outside the door, but don't be late!

Third, make sure to attend the Member Meeting and Awards Ceremony. At the Member Meeting, Laura Namy will introduce you to our new Washington headquarters and new staff and organization, she will elaborate on what SRCD does for you, and she will review the inclusivity survey, rapid response proposal, planned town hall, and open science movement. SRCD exists to enhance your professional experience - this is your chance to get to know the folks who make that possible and what they do for you. The Member Meeting is immediately followed by our biennial Awards Ceremony. Come to support your colleagues, friends, and mentors as the Society takes the opportunity of the Biennial to honor them for their accomplishments -- from Dissertation Awards to lifetime Distinguished Scientific Contributions.

Fourth, on Friday, make plans to catch 2 evening events. Come to hear inspirational speaker Wes Moore, author of the *New York Times* best-selling *The Other Wes Moore*, re-tell his stirring account of growing up in Baltimore. I am not going to steal his thunder, but you will want to attend **Moore's** compelling developmental comparative story. Right afterward, SRCD is throwing a Block Party from 6 to 8 PM that will feature music and food trucks with food available for purchase.

Fifth, on Saturday at 1:00 pm don't miss an address by Congressman Elijah E. Cummings, who is representative from Maryland's 7th District, Baltimore. Congressman Cummings has said: "Our children are the living messages that we send to a future we will never see."

Beside his passionate interest in child development and child welfare, Congressman Cummings is currently chair of the Committee on Oversight and Government Reform. Enough said!





Sixth, choose among a series of Professional Development Workshops we have scheduled over the entire conference that will enable you to delve into practical issues and fine tune your interests and capacities related to grants, media, careers, policy, statistics, Twitter, and more.

These new features of the 2019 Biennial complement an extraordinarily rich, varied, and engaging scientific program. The 2019 Biennial begins Thursday morning with a complimentary breakfast reception (7:30 am) followed at 8:00 am by the Presidential Address.

Consider all of these events as you shape your personal schedule for the Biennial.

The submitted program includes 5,155 presentations that are similarly diverse both in terms of areas of scientific inquiry and demographics of the presenters and research participants. - Each day over the lunch hour will be a series of TAD Talks. Grab a lunch to eat while you listen to three 15-minute talks each day that will sparkle with new ideas presented in a compelling format.
- Professional Development Workshops are scheduled over the course of the entire conference to enable you to delve into practical issues related to grant funding, communicating with the media, translating research into policy, statistical analyses, and more.



P-002. Fathers are Parents too! Broadening Research on Parenting for Child Development

Integrative Statement: Sponsored by: Brigham Young University Despite strong evidence that fathers make important and potentially unique contributions to children's development, fathers are still not included regularly in research that examines the effects of parenting on children's development, and are too often dismissed by scholars as less important than mothers or unavailable and too challenging to study. This is especially true for nonresident, low-income, and minority fathers, even though these fathers also actively contribute to their children's positive development and wellbeing in critical ways. Moreover, even as widespread popular support for fathers' active involvement in parenting has increased, media portrayals of fathers continue to often depict them as less competent than mothers, many health and social service providers treat them as auxiliary parental figures, and social policy continues to ignore their contributions. The focus of this pre-conference is to bring together scholars from multiple disciplines (e.g., developmental psychology, family science, sociology, social work, public policy) and at a range of career stages (e.g., undergraduate and graduate students, early career researchers, leaders in the field) to share and discuss state-of-the-art research on fathers and fathering, and how we can best disseminate this work to influence the culture of parenting research, practice, and policy. P-004. Data from the Early Childhood Longitudinal Study, Kindergarten Class of 2010-11 (ECLS-K:2011) at NCES and Data Analysis using the R Package EdSurvey

Integrative Statement: This course provides researchers with information about the Early Childhood Longitudinal Study, Kindergarten Class of 2010-11 (ECLS-K: 2011) and data analysis using the R package EdSurvey, which was developed for analyzing NCES large-scale assessment data with complex psychometric and sampling designs. Data from the ECLS-K: 2011 allow researchers to examine the relationships between a wide range of family, school, classroom, and individual characteristics and children's development, learning, and school performance in kindergarten and across the elementary school years. EdSurvey, the free and open-source R package, provides researchers, analysts, and educators an accurate, affordable, and accessible way to analyze the ECLS-K: 2011 data. This one-day course will be a lecture format in the morning sessions with hands-on experience using the R package EdSurvey in the afternoon sessions. The course will begin with an overview of the ECLS-K: 2011 study design, sample, and data collection components. After participants are familiarized with the study, the course will address working with the ECLS-K:2011's complex data and appropriately using sample weights and estimating variance, as well as technical issues such as composite variables and missing data. Next, the participants will learn how to access the data and how to work with the Electronic Codebook (ECB). This session will also include information on how to identify the correct weights for a given ECLS-K:2011 analysis and how to find the weights in the ECB. In the afternoon sessions, participants will be introduced to the data software R package EdSurvey to analyze the ECLS-K: 2011 data. This package is being developed to analyze NCES databases. The afternoon sessions will focus on the use of the R package EdSurvey to visualize the data and conduct descriptive or inferential analyses, such as cross-tabulation, linear regression and logistic regression using the ECLS-K: 2011 data. At the end of the course, there will be an opportunity to practice analyzing data with R while the instructors are available to answer questions. To participate in the extensive hands-on portion in the afternoon, participants MUST bring their own laptops with the latest version of R and R studio preinstalled. Participants are also encouraged to download and install the ECLS-K: 2011 ECB available at the National Center for Education Statistics website. NOTE: The ECB only works on PC operating systems. However, Mac users may still attend the training and participate in the R practice session.

P-005. Conceptualizing and measuring culture, context, race and ethnicity: A focus on science, ethics, and collaboration in the Spirit of 2044

Integrative Statement: Sponsored by the William T. Grant Foundation In 2015, the United States Census projected that by 2044, the U.S. will become a "majority-minority" country with no racial/ethnic group having a numerical majority. This shift is expected to occur for youth under the age of 18 by 2020. These demographic shifts challenge developmental scientists to examine unique and universal processes that promote the growth, thriving, and resilience of these populations in this new landscape and also take into account systems of oppression, power, privilege, racial justice and structural disadvantage. International perspectives are also critical as global patterns of immigration and migration have led to the increased diversification across the world. Building on key work done in the 1990s and 2000s (Helms et al., 2005; Spencer & McLloyd, 1990; Garcia Coll et al., 1996; Knight et al., 2009; Spencer, 2006), this pre-conference will focus on measuring and conceptualizing "minority" populations within the context of the greater diversification of the U.S. (e.g., mono-racial/ethnic individuals as well as multiracial/children and youth). The goals of the pre-conference are as follows: (1) Identify best practices in the conceptualization and measurement of race and ethnicity in developmental science at the individual and contextual levels, (2) Stimulate a dialogue that translates to an actionable agenda designed to tackle issues of conceptualizing and measurement of key constructs associated with race/ethnicity, and (3) Highlight key strategies for building interdisciplinary teams to conduct ethical and responsible work with diverse populations that include scholars of color. The pre-conference will result in recommendations for scholars on how to move beyond description and achieve deeper measurement in our research across all methodologies (i.e., quantitative and qualitative). Additionally, working breakout groups will focus on critical issues in developmental science with diverse populations focusing on measurement, methodology, and ethics, and a follow-up invited salon at the biennial conference will highlight key recommendations on how to build interdisciplinary and collaborative research teams that bring the necessary expertise to tackle issues of race and ethnicity in the U.S and abroad. At the conclusion of the pre-conference, participants will have a better understanding of how we forge ahead to use and translate our scholarship to address the ethnic and racial issues of the U.S. and across the globe in the Spirit of 2044. Integrative Statement: The theme I pursue focuses on the multi-layered journeys of life and scholarship. Together, we will halt at the following ports of call. 1-003. Lexical Networks in Typical and Atypical Development

Integrative Statement: The mental lexicon is organised by a structure of cues that links words together because their referents share semantics aspects, phonological traits, associative relations, among other features. How early is the mental lexicon organised? Under which parameters can we study this organisation? Moreover, do children with a neurodevelopmental syndrome form a structured mental lexicon? A series of empirical studies sheds light onto these questions. We demonstrate that not only under neurodevelopmental conditions, but also those with a genetic syndrome exhibit an effect of a direct relationship between two words. Moreover, the links between words are evidenced in direct relationships as well as through an activated mediated item in typical development. Finally, we raised the issue of whether these semantic networks are preserved with aging.

Development Across the Life-course in High Adversity Settings

Chair: *Natasha Chaku* Speaker: *Mark Tomlinson*

Integrative Statement: Unlocking human potential depends on sensitive parental care that is responsive to the needs of children. In contexts of high adversity, the capacity of parents to provide the kind of care that promotes positive child developmental outcomes can be severely compromised. Even though early interventions can have direct or indirect long-term consequences, high levels of developmental risk can overwhelm the effects of normally protective influences, which provide potential explanations for early intervention gains fading in high-risk populations. In this presentation I will discuss findings from a number of longitudinal studies (one across 18 years), conducted in South Africa and Lesotho in order to highlight the complexities of delivering interventions in contexts of adversity, and to draw attention to gaps in our knowledge about mechanism, dose, timing and duration of interventions to ensure that children and adolescents in low and middle income countries are able to meet their developmental potential.

Integrative Statement: Child development researchers are increasingly willing to acknowledge gross inadequacies in current demographic data practices, such as asking youth participants to select "male" or "female," or comparing youth participants using the pan-racial/ethnic categories of "White", "Black," "Asian," "Latino/Hispanic" and "Other." Youth whose identities are not reflected in survey items may experience this exclusion as yet another identity invalidation. This exclusion furthermore undermines the scientific foundation available for advocating for the rights of marginalized youth. Colleagues ask each other questions like, "What options should I give when asking participants to indicate gender?" or "What should I do with participants who select different race/ethnicities at each wave of my study?" We have reached a critical turning point, not just for scholars focused on questions of identity, but for all scholars who seek developmentally and culturally responsive methods for researching diverse children and youth. This roundtable will facilitate a conversation to offer developmental scientists specific considerations regarding why and how to collect demographic data that is responsive to participants who do not identify with clear-cut, binary or monolithic survey boxes. Building this specific framework and sharing cutting-edge concrete tools will help propel the field forward towards increasing accuracy, inclusivity, and representation in child development research. This roundtable thus supports the SRCD strategic plan by advancing developmental science methods and integrating diversity into our data sets and knowledge base. The moderator will be Dr. Miriam Arbeit (Assistant Professor of Psychology, Suffolk University), whose scholarship includes both identity-specific and general population research.

Integrative Statement: Measuring quality is ubiquitous in early care and education (ECE) research, policy, and program implementation. There are multiple measures designed to be used at the program or classroom level. Some classroom level measures focus on global quality while others focus on specific domains. A small set of observational measures are frequently used for various purposes, including describing the quality of ECE in research studies, serving as one component in a public rating of quality as part of a quality rating and improvement system (QRIS) or accountability system, and informing professional development and technical assistance. Yet the research notes multiple challenges and limitations with current measures, including modest relationships between quality measures and child outcomes and difficulty obtaining and maintaining high-levels of inter-rater agreement. This session builds on expert meetings on measurement hosted by the Office of Planning, Research and Evaluation in the Administration for Children and Families, U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Integrative Statement: During this roundtable four teams will reflect on their experiences conducting national studies that yield important information about child development and child care contexts, particularly for children from underrepresented and minority populations. The roundtable will be moderated by Dr. Meryl Barofsky, a Senior Social Science Research Analyst at the Office of Planning, Research and Evaluation within the Administration for Children and Families. The four national studies include: (1) The Head Start Family and Child Experiences Survey (FACES); (2) The Migrant and Seasonal Head Start (MSHS) Study; (3) American Indian and Alaska Native (AI/AN) Head Start Family and Child Experiences Survey; and, (4) The National Survey or Early Care and Education (NSECE). Two of these national studies focus on special populations (MSHS and AI/AN Head Start), whereas the other two include many different special populations (FACES and NSECE). Furthermore, three of these studies (FACES, MSHS, and AI/AN) are focused on low-income Head Start recipients, whereas the NSECE is focused more broadly on a variety of care types. This assortment of national studies will allow panelists to identify similarities and differences in how they prioritized decisions related to child assessments, questions and topics related to child development and child care, data sources, analyses and dissemination strategies. Integrative Statement: Within contemporary developmental science, description, explanation, and optimization goals are increasingly pursued within models framed by relational developmental systems (RDS) metatheory, which emphasizes that relative plasticity systematic changes in mutually influential relations between a specific individual and his/her specific context characterizes life-span development. The non-ergodicity and idiography of these dynamic, individual-context relations mean that specificity should be the starting point of efforts to optimize each human life or to promote equity, opportunity, and social justice among diverse youth. To illustrate how RDS-based models can capitalize on the plasticity, non-ergodicity, and specificity to enhance youth thriving, I discuss findings from the Compassion International Study of Positive Youth Development, a multination longitudinal investigation of thriving among majorityworld youth. I note directions for future RDS-based research aimed at promoting health, thriving, and social justice among diverse youth, and I emphasize the timeliness and potential impacts of a focus on global youth.

Integrative Statement: Comprehensive community initiatives (CCIs) are locally organized, multi-sector collaborations that build the capacity of a particular place to coordinate public resources, mobilize previously untapped family, cultural, and community-based resources, and design social interventions that lead to better population-level outcomes (Kubisch et al., 2011). Despite the variation in terminology (e.g., Promise Neighborhoods, collective impact), CCIs employ the philosophy that improved population-level outcomes for children and families can best be achieved by engaging multiple community systems, structures, and constituencies that coalesce around a common goal and work in concert to achieve that goal (Zaff, Donlan, Pufall Jones, Lin &



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Anderson, 2016). CCIs have gained momentum over the past decade, with national non-profits, Federal agencies, and even consultancies fueling a movement to create systemic change. CCI exemplars tend to have strong learning and evaluation systems that are responsive to the needs of the community. Often, external researchers, whether at a local university or an independent research institution, provide the research infrastructure. This workshop is designed for researchers who want to learn how to create and/or optimize these research-practice partnerships. The workshop will be led by two research centers that have been involved in multiple CCI research-practice partnerships and can talk about promising practices - and practices to avoid. The workshop will offer an overview of CCIs and the tenets of research-practice partnerships, followed by role-play exercises that will surface the dynamics of learning and improvement that are unique to CCIs. Integrative Statement: For decades, the terminology used to refer to individuals of Latin American descent has undergone transformations. In 1980, under the Nixon administration, the term Hispanic was implemented in the U.S. Census. Hispanic refers to people who are from countries where the primary language is Spanish. The use of the ethnic term Latino followed to include individuals from countries that do not speak Spanish such as those from Brazil, Belize, French Guiana, Guyana, as well as those from the Caribbean, Mexico, and Central and South American. Later, modifications such as Latino/a and Latin@ were added to include both feminine and masculine genders. While this was an effort to step away from the traditional, masculine-centric language ingrained in the Spanish language, these terms still encourage a gender binary and exclude various intersections of gender and sexual identity. In 2014, the term Latinx [pronounced: la-teen-ex] emerged as a gender-neutral label for Latino/a and by 2016 the number of times it was used spiked (Salinas & Lozano, 2017; Santos, 2017). Since then, research-related entities, such as the National Latinx Psychological Association, and the Journal of Latinx Psychology, have adopted the "x." This roundtable will provide opportunities for the audience to discuss and learn from inter/national expert researchers about the pros and cons of using social identifiers such as Latinx in research with individuals from Latin American and indigenous backgrounds. Integrative Statement: Moderator: Emily Abel, M.S. Insufficient sleep is an internationally recognized public health concern. However, because sleep follows distinct developmental patterns, it is often difficult to broadly define what qualifies as 'sufficient' vs. 'insufficient' sleep in a clinical context, and similarly to measure and categorize sleep in a research context. To aid clinicians and researchers on their quest to understand, measure, and promote optimal sleep, the American Academy of Sleep Medicine (Paruthi et al., 2016) and the National Sleep Foundation (Hirshkowitz et al., 2015) each established consensus recommendations, which describe sleep duration needs at varying stages across child development. Although these consensus recommendations are a great resource for physicians and parents, there are numerous considerations to make when determining how exactly to apply them. For example, are these recommendations applicable across all contexts and populations? Do these recommendations account for individual differences in sleep need? Is duration the best way to determine whether an individual is getting sufficient sleep? Panelists will debate how their own workincluding the context in which they study sleep—aligns with consensus recommendations. They will further provide advice on how these recommendations can be best utilized within a developmental framework for studying sleep, and what aspects of sleep may be most important to measure at various stages of development. We expect this roundtable will facilitate conversations about how to optimize child sleep within both clinical and research settings, as well as encourage scholars across interdisciplinary and diverse backgrounds to measure developmentally consequential indices of sleep.

Integrative Statement: According to recent estimates, approximately 11% of the world's population live below the poverty line, the majority of whom are children (World Bank, 2016). The impact of poverty on child development has been widely studied, but has focused on poverty's adverse consequences including poorer health, cognitive and socio-emotional outcomes (Brooks-Gunn & Duncan, 1997). The most pronounced disparities for children of low socioeconomic status (LSES) are in language proficiency and executive functioning (EF), which include inhibition, focused attention, and working memory (Farah et al., 2006; Noble, 2017). Evidence from neuroscience and developmental psychology largely substantiate the detrimental impact of LSES on EF and thus point at a deficit model of what poor children 'can't do.' However, several lines of evidence challenge this deficit model of EF among poor children, alternatively providing support for a strengths-based perspective. One study found that children with better task switching abilities show worse response inhibition than children who perseverate more (Blackwell et al., 2014). Additionally, researchers have found that Bolivian street children score better on measures of the Alternative Uses Task - a common measure of creativity compared to their LSES non-homeless counterparts (Dahlman et al., 2012). This roundtable conversation will therefore discuss research that challenges the traditional deficit model of EF among LSES children. The session will be moderated by Professor Adele Diamond and draw on international and interdisciplinary perspectives to understand the nuances of this area.

Integrative Statement: Social and emotional development in early childhood has attracted recent attention from federal and state policymakers and programs leaders (Gayl, 2017). Evidence of expulsions and suspensions for young children and disparities by race and gender have galvanized interest in innovative methods to support improvements in teachers' practices in early care and education settings (U.S. Department of Health and Human Services and U.S. Department of Education, 2016). New approaches that emphasize community partnerships, learning collaboratives, continuous improvement cycles, and organizational capacity-building within and across early care and education programs are sparking a paradigm shift that holds promise for strengthening the system that promotes young children's developmental outcomes. Kathryn Tout will moderate this conversation roundtable to examine critical questions about how new improvement methods are expected to work, why they are anticipated to be more effective than traditional professional development initiatives, the feasibility of implementing new improvement methods within existing systems and strategies for evaluating outcomes at multiple levels (programs, staff and children). Integrative Statement: This presentation shares key findings from 17 years of mixed-methods, cohortsequential, longitudinal research with 12,000 children and their families in Ethiopia, India, Peru and Vietnam. It highlights significant achievements in child nutrition and education access, some surprising evidence around gender and major challenges in relation to socio-economic inequality and service quality, also noting the emergence of 'new' developmental risks for children due to rising overweight and obesity. The presentation makes the case that, contrary to the assumptions of much research and many interventions, adolescence is a time of extraordinary responsibility in low-income settings, with young people struggling to meet competing gendered expectations with regard to education, productive and reproductive work, marriage and parenthood. It calls for far greater policy attention to the second decade of life, also arguing for integrated approaches that are effectively grounded in local cultural and political-economic realities and take full account of young people's perspectives.

Integrative Statement: This Conversation Roundtable raises core scientific concerns, theoretical and methodological, that jeopardize many current large-scale efforts to implement change in the child-developmentrelated practices of communities that differ from standards prescribed as optimal in mainstream Western culture. The research invoked to support those standards remains largely confined to a narrow "WEIRD" sample of the world's population (Henrich et al., 2010). Intervention programs tend to rest on a premise that the practices of such populations are normal, while culturally different socialization practices need to be "improved" to maximize children's development. In addition to lacking fundamental scientific rigor, such approaches raise complex politicalethical-moral issues related to social justice. Too often, they reflect an ethnocentric view of the "best way" to raise children. This Roundtable will consider several examples of prominent research (e.g., attachment, the word-gap, and early-childhood-education) that are being widely 'applied' in diverse cultural settings via well-funded practice or/and policy. Drawing on these discussions and their own interdisciplinary research, the panelists will address a rich range of framing issues that emerge in areas such as Central America, India and Sub-Saharan Africa with a view to initiating a future-oriented conversation with the audience, We regard this topic as lying at the heart of both SRCD's Strategic Plan (instantiated in the new Lecture Series on

Child Development in a Diverse Majority Society) and this **Biennial's organizing themes. Exploration in this Roundtable** should serve as a complement to several other sessions, notably the Invited/TAD presentations of Britto, Lombardi, and Smith.

Integrative Statement: Research approaches aimed at translating evidence-based interventions into real world practice settings are hindered by a lack of understanding of the intersections between effectiveness, feasibility and implementation. We offer an alternative conceptualization of applied research that is necessary for a meaningful marriage between science and practice, characterized by a desire to build as opposed to translate "real world" evidence (i.e., scientifically grounded information created, tested, analyzed, and understood in relevant practice settings). This is distinguished from evidence emanating from highly controlled conditions that undergoes processes of adaptation and transformation to "fit" the real world context. A meaningful approach to building real world evidence requires a partnership between researchers and practitioners who, by design, work together to address implementation realities and enhance understandings of efficacy and feasibility. Research-practice partnerships (RPPs) are concerned with improving programs, processes, or practices in ways that are both feasible and efficacious, and that result in improved student outcomes. Unfortunately, there remain many gaps in mechanisms to support building real-world evidence through RPPs. Comprised of a consortium of researchers concerned with establishing evidence of parent-provider interventions in early childcare centers, this conversation roundtable will address thorny issues faced when building a real-world evidence base. The issues center on challenging constructs that simultaneously influence impact: evidence/feasibility, implementation, and partnership. Each of these issues requires deeper vetting and processing among early childhood intervention scientists to uncover impactful programs for creating "real world" evidence. Integrative Statement: Growing up in poverty is associated

with detrimental effects on children's cognitive development, brain development, health and achievement. Yet, the extent to which the most straightforward antipoverty intervention - giving families money - improves early childhood development has never been tested. Launched in May, 2018, the Baby's First Years (BFY) study is the first randomized controlled trial of poverty reduction in early childhood in the United States. In this session, the interdisciplinary team of investigators leading this work experts in the neuroscience, economics, social policy and psychology of early childhood - will discuss the design and development of this landmark study, moderated by Jeanne Brooks-Gunn, whose work has been foundational in understanding the role of poverty in child development. The premise is simple: One thousand low-income mothers are being recruited shortly after giving birth, from ten hospitals across the US. Mothers are randomized to receive either a large monthly cash gift or a nominal monthly cash gift for the first 40 months of their children's lives. Mothers may spend the cash gift, administered via debit card, however they choose. Families will be followed annually from birth through age three, in order to estimate impacts on a host of child cognitive, socio-emotional, neural and health outcomes, as well as maternal health and family functioning. Based on past work, the cash gifts are expected to be large enough to produce meaningful differences in child development in the first three years of life, when the developing brain is thought to be most malleable to experience.

Integrative Statement: The Measuring Early Learning Quality & Outcomes Project (MELQO) was initiated by UNESCO, UNICEF, World Bank, and Brookings Institution in 2014 to support early childhood measurement in low- and middle-income countries. Drawing on expertise from many experts, the MELQO Consortium developed a set of tools to measure quality of pre-primary education and child development at the start of formal schooling. Reporting on the MELQO journey and results from several countries, this session will cover several themes, including the role of global organizations in setting priorities for global early childhood development; empirical results on psychometric properties of the scales and associations between quality and child development; and new initiatives to address the need for cross-country learning, capacity-building and culturally-relevant measurement in child development.

Integrative Statement: All babies cry and they have to learn to console themselves, to learn to sleep through the night and overcome neophobia to accept solid food in infancy. This is often described as bio-behavioural adaptation. However, if the attempts at adaptation fail and continue beyond a normative period (e.g. excessive crying continues beyond the 3 months colic period), this indicates early regulatory problems, i.e. the inability to stop an ongoing behavior such as crying or waking at night. Around 10% of infants experience more than one regulatory problem at the same time, i.e. multiple regulatory problems (MRP). Although highly challenging for parents, MRP often occur despite sensitive parenting. New evidence will be presented that MRP increases the risk of dysregulation across childhood and has cascading effects on mental health in childhood, adolescence and even adulthood. These findings have implications for research on childhood self-regulation and clinical implications for treatment.

Integrative Statement: Should I pursue a postdoc? Where do I get one? How can I make the most of it? These are some questions frequently encountered by graduate students as they approach the end of their doctoral training. Although many helpful resources have emerged for students interested in pursuing faculty positions, information on the road to and through postdoc-ing remains more elusive. Led by two postdoctoral researchers (Dr. Hannah Schacter and Dr. Adam Hoffman), this workshop brings together postdocs across multiple developmental disciplines to share their experiences in postdoctoral roles. During the workshop, we will a) review the postdoc search and application process, focusing on identifying funding mechanisms and determining a good fit b) consider the benefits (and drawbacks) of pursuing a postdoctoral position and c) discuss how to maximize a postdoc in preparation for the job market. Workshop panelists have successfully acquired postdoctoral positions through PI grants, institutional fellowships, as well as National Science Foundation and National Institutes of Health funding, and

represent diverse areas of study, including but not limited to bio-behavioral correlates of early life stress, cognitive and early home predictors of academic achievement, and adolescent identity development. The session is intended to generate an interactive discussion amongst audience members and panelists, with time dedicated to Q&A and collaborative activities. Integrative Statement: Morality is a fundamental part of being human, with evolutionary origins, philosophical roots, and societal relevance. Novel cutting edge lines of research from dominant frameworks such as social domain theory, along with recent research from evolutionary and socialemotional perspectives, have provided an expansion of topics in the field. While the expansion has provided new connections between moral judgments, emotions, and behaviors, tensions have emerged about how to frame, define, and measure morality, and what types of judgments, emotions, and behaviors count as moral. Central to discuss includes whether morality is a form of cooperation, how to reconcile morality as entailing compliance to norms or resistance to inequality, whether there is a judgment-action gap, the role of parents, and how to conceptualize the transition from social behavior to moral judgment. Scholars outside of development science research draw on our theories and findings. Dialogue about these issues among proponents of different developmental science approaches is necessary to advance the field. The Roundtable Conversation, moderated by Melanie Killen, will address current debates in the field, and provide a forum for an integrative discussion about moral development from childhood to adolescence. Five internationally known researchers will address these controversies and invite audience participation and exchange. The issues are: 1) relationships between cooperation and morality; 2) resistance to unfair treatment and social inequalities; 3) parental interactions as a source of influence; 4) the transition from social behavior to moral judgment; and 5) the role of emotions and judgments in the acquisition and development of morality.

Integrative Statement: Children around the world are exposed to major natural and human-influenced disasters at an alarming and accelerating rate. Major storms, wildfires, terror attacks, famines, and wars displace large populations, disrupt lives, and traumatize, kill, or disable children, family members, and entire communities. The purpose of this session is to bring together experts who have studied the effects of disasters on children, but also volunteered and consulted with diverse agencies in multiple countries around the world, in an effort to guide preparedness and support for the well-being of children in these extreme situations. Panel experiences include research and consultation for victims of hurricanes (Katrina, Sandy, Maria), earthquakes and associated tsunamis (Chile, Nepal, Japan, New Zealand), and political conflicts, war, and terror (Cambodian, Syrian, Rohingya). The discussion will highlight evidence that inequality and cultural influences permeate disparities in the magnitude of the effects of the disasters on children's well-being, and also influence resilience capacity and pathways of recovery. Questions for discussion will focus on how inequalities are revealed by disasters; how cultural processes contribute to risk and resilience; and how developmental science and scientists can contribute to research, policy, and practice to protect children and foster recovery in disasters. Basic and applied research illuminating developmental processes will be discussed to elucidate these phenomena with respect to both universal and contextualized dimensions. Integrative Statement: Memory is a cornerstone ability upon which children build knowledge of the world. The study of what changes in memory across development and the mechanisms underlying these changes have been of interest to developmental psychologists for over 50 years. The now-famous question of "What is memory development the development of" (Falvell, 1971) has fueled the creation of numerous paradigms that have shed considerable light on children's memory abilities across development. However, we have come to a cross-roads in terms of progress, as the number and type memory assessments has grown and yielded a multitude of diverse paradigms that tap different aspects of memory (e.g., episodic vs. semantic, short-term vs. long-term, binding vs. source) and different neural substrates. At present, it is unclear whether the different methods used across development engage the same aspects of memory or similar neural correlates. This heterogeneity

is problematic for multiple reasons. First, it limits our ability to fully understand precise changes in memory overtime. Second, it also prevents us from taking advantage of advances in big data science and technology because it is unclear whether pooling resources and sharing data across memory paradigms is advisable. This Conversation Roundtable will bring together leaders in the field of memory development who represent a diverse array of perspectives and training backgrounds. The goal of the Roundtable is to discuss these pressing issues that currently impede progress in the field and explore whether developing common methodology would be a useful avenue to pursue now or in the future.

Integrative Statement: The past two decades have seen a surge in research on trauma-informed practice (TIP) for children and adolescents exposed to potentially traumatic events, including racism/discrimination, abuse/neglect, and violence. These practices involve efforts to increase awareness of traumatic stress throughout a system (e.g., education, juvenile justice, child welfare) to enhance the quality and delivery of services provided to youth to promote thriving (Bracey, Arzubi, Vanderploeg, & Franks, 2013; Hanson & Lang, 2016). A growing body of research suggests the developmental benefits of youth participation in trauma-informed interventions, including reduced internalizing and externalizing problems and enhanced social and emotional skills (Cohen et al., 2016; Collins et al., 2011). However, variation in TIP definitions, measures, and implementation strategies across the fields of psychology, psychiatry, social work, developmental science, and public health poses challenges to researchers and practitioners (Champine, Matlin, Strambler, & Tebes, 2018; Tebes, Champine, Matlin, & Strambler, 2018). This roundtable will be moderated by Dr. Robey Champine and will explore the following question: "What conceptual and methodological challenges have emerged from the growing scope of research on TIP for children and adolescents, and what are the implications of this work for future research, policy, and practice?" This discussion will advance understanding of the state of the literature on TIP and will elucidate challenges related to how we define, implement, measure, and sustain data-driven practices that aim to optimize development among trauma-affected youth.





Discussion will highlight gaps in the literature, lessons learned from the field, and potential directions for future research and practice.

Improved mental health appears to be an important mechanism, driving better outcomes in surviving children.

Integrative Statement: Concerns about replication and the reproducibility of empirical findings have risen dramatically in psychology over the past decade. It is reasonable to ask whether developmental science is similarly facing such a "replication crisis" and, if so, what should be done about it. The first portion of this talk will review the concerns commonly raised in psychology and related disciplines, as well as recommendations put forth for encouraging replication, open science, and responsible data analysis practices. The second portion of this talk will consider the unique position of developmental science, relative to the experimental subdisciplines of psychology that have predominated much of the discussion about replication. Specifically, I will consider some of the challenges of replication and reproducibility with large, naturalistic, longitudinal studies, as well as the greater emphasis on contextual, developmental, and historic differences inherent in much of developmental research. The third portion of this talk will propose a new paradigm, in which individual study results are deemphasized and accumulating streams of multiple study results are prioritized as sources of knowledge within developmental science. Tools for facilitating this research accumulation will be described, as will challenges of this approach within our traditional approach conducting developmental science.

Integrative Statement: While early identification and treatment of health problems - as well as their bioecological risk factors - are critically important, this deficit perspective fails to consider positive health assets that are indicative of children's overall well-being. Since the majority of children do not face such health challenges, this exclusive focus on the negative categorizes most children as "healthy" because they are not "unwell." Such an approach misses the broad spectrum of individual differences in children's well-being and prohibits understanding of whether and how certain children could be doing better or may be at risk for poorer outcomes in the future. The lack of focus on positive health assets represents a broader issue in the current way health and well-being are conceptualized and measured, as the field lacks 1) a cohesive definition of well-being in general and at particular time points across the life course; 2) consensus on how to best measure this construct; and 3) policies focused on promoting positive assets rather than preventing

negative problems. These challenges are amplified by the lack of transdisciplinary work across the fields of developmental psychology, education, pediatrics, and population health, each of which have their own nuanced definition of a construct that is already ill-defined. This conversation roundtable will be moderated by Dr. Rachel Flynn, PhD, Associate Director of Northwestern University's Institute for Innovations in Developmental Sciences (DevSci), and brings together four panelists representing the research-policy-practice paradigm to discuss conceptual underpinnings of positive health and well-being, innovative measurement strategies, and implications for policy and practice.

Integrative Statement: Past research has shown that children can use information, such as history of accuracy, familiarity, age, gender, accent, etc. to modulate their learning and judgment of other people. While most studies suggest that children prefer to learn from an accurate informant rather than an inaccurate one, they are also willing to accept an inaccurate informant as a potential source of information. More recent work has extended children's selective trust beyond word learning to other domains such as communicative cues, attractiveness, social promise, STEM learning, as well as technological sources (e.g., computer, robots and even AI). However, there are several major theoretical and methodological issues that remain unaddressed to date. For example, what are the theoretical accounts or mechanisms that contribute children's selective trust? Is there a unified theory that fully explains the literature on the development of selective trust? What is known about the characteristics of the learner that interact with context and cognitive skills in selective trust? Is selective learning a form of cultural learning? Apart from accuracy, are there new dependent variables necessary to examine selective trust in a nuanced way? Is there a more ecologically valid way to establish history of accuracy? These issues are of significant interests to researchers and scholars in this field. This conversational roundtable aims to generate vibrant discussions among the panelists and audience with various perspectives, as well as to provide a platform to bring people together to share their experiences and views on this topic. Integrative Statement: One of the fundamental ingredients for high-quality developmental science is a reliable and representative stream of participants. In a recent survey of infant researchers (n = 108; Brand, unpublished), 32% reported being "somewhat dissatisfied" or "extremely dissatisfied" with their recruiting numbers, and 43% said the types of studies they undertook were limited by the slow pace of infant recruitment. In this panel, moderated by Melanie Soderstrom, four scholars describe their most successful and cost-effective strategies for recruiting infant subjects. Klaus Libertus discusses using Facebook ads to target key demographics, as well as cultivating a successful online presence (e.g., lab Facebook page). Rebecca Brand describes a strategy of inviting parents to lab for no-stringsattached "playdates." Hosting playdates builds rapport with parents in the community and helps overcome many of the obstacles to their agreeing to research participation. Caitlin Fausey (with collaborators Jenny Mendoza and Stephanie Gluck) will discuss the University of Oregon's "Team Duckling" initiative to improve community visibility via better branding (e.g., new logo) and building community partnerships. Finally, Nicole Sugden presents findings from interviews with parents about their motives for participation, as well as from her experimental study of recruiting scripts at community events. She finds that success of script types is influenced by race of target and race of researcher. Her work suggests ways to craft targeted, empirically-based, and inclusive recruitment strategies. In addition to sharing these four successful strategies, we envision that conversation among panelists and audience members will reveal a rich collection of recruitment best-practices.

Integrative Statement: Research increasingly highlights a different focus for early infant sleep that emphasizes the importance of responding to infants' cues and

understanding developmental changes. This research gives us the opportunity to turn the conversation from questions about the benefits or risks of behavioral approaches to infant sleep, such as crying to sleep, and move us toward conversations centered on approaches incorporating early developmentally appropriate interactions and strong family systems. In this roundtable, we initiate discussion of approaches to infant sleep that contribute to parents' sense

approaches to infant sleep that contribute to parents' sense of efficacy in care choices by introducing new findings in infant sleep research. We invite participants to engage in conversation about how these findings impact our understanding of infant sleep practice and infant and family outcomes. We examine potential for changes in the nature of best practices for infant sleep. We invite conversation that translates current findings to sleep recommendations that align with a diversity of parental needs and goals. We further examine whether these findings can move both science and applied practice beyond the debate about behavioral extinction practices as a best practice to impact infant sleep patterns. We will invite discussion of questions often overtaken by emotional debates or conflicting positions and turn the conversation away from care practices associated with infant distress to recommendations focused on responsiveness, synchrony, and healthy child and family outcomes. Integrative Statement: This Roundtable is designed to develop scholarly and broader capacity for critical racial socialization discussions as they intersect with other socialization messages (e.g., ethnicity, gender, class, sexuality, religion, immigrant status, and ability) particularly for young children. Racial and ethnic socialization are generally conceptualized as compensatory and protective processes engaged in by ethnic and racial non-dominant families to help prepare their children and adolescents for negative social bias (Hughes, Rodriguez, Smith, Johnson, Stevenson, & Spicer 2006). This Roundtable encompasses socialization messages around all privileged and minoritized identities with an aim at identifying microsocialization messages and how they affect children's development as well as the capacities for socialization agents (e.g., caregivers, educators, peers, researchers, media) to re-message intentionally. Grounded in an intersectional perspective, this Roundtable explores processes that inform racial (and other) socialization messages consumed broadly by children across contexts, but with a particular focus on school-based locations and embedded in cultural and contextual ecologies. The tripronged Roundtable foci include conceptualizing socialization messages and how they relate to identity development, discussing ways to study and measure socialization practices and related processes in children's everyday contexts, and addressing how to develop intentional, intersectional, and humanizing socialization messages by a range of socialization agents. The childcentered discussion seeks to identify interventions and how to re-message at personal, social, and structural levels. Considerable time will be reserved for audience questions and discussion.





Integrative Statement: This panel will address how scientists can use research on developmentally-sensitive investigative interviewing and conversations with children

to facilitate methodological decisions that will generate robust and reliable science. Scientists studying children's memory, narratives, and eyewitness testimony have developed methods that are most likely to elicit accurate, complete, and honest reports from youth. These researchers have established that how questions are phrased, how children are prepared for the task, and the context in which children are questioned, matter profoundly. In this Roundtable, researchers whose work focuses on eliciting information from youth will provide insight into how research in their respective topic areas and fields (developmental psychology, education, criminology) can inform data collection with youth across different domains of developmental science. The panel, moderated by forensic developmental psychologist Dr. Lindsay Malloy, will bring together a diverse group of experts who have knowledge that can be adapted to inform the methodological practices of developmental scientists when it comes to gathering information from youth. The panelists will note some key recommendations and engage in discussion and debate with audience members. This panel should be of interest to all researchers who interview or otherwise gather self- reports from youth. Integrative Statement: As an anthropologist of communication in childhood, I argue that the Language Gap debate is mired in ethical blind spots across ethnographic and developmental approaches. These blind spots fuel disciplinary impasses to productive dialogue regarding global-local moral economies of talk and knowledge that infuse the lives of young children. All scholars in this debate fervently commit to reduction of economic inequality. Yet, they divide in ethical investments in human and cultural rights, universal and situated truths, objective and subjective knowledge, and neoliberal advocacy of the individual and social capitalist advocacy of government to achieve economic parity. Ethical fault lines blind scholars to how much they need one another's invaluable expertise. Significantly, in light of postcolonialism, global uprisings,

and critical social science since the 1960s, scholars for and against Language Gap interventions have lost sight of the ethical problematics of their own privileged positionality in representing what is best for others.

SRCD's initial response to the U.S. policy of separating Latinx families at the US/Mexico border demonstrated the inadequacies of a colorblind approach. The resulting frustration and disappointment among segments of the membership sparked the need for SRCD to reconsider the initial response. In the midst of demographic changes and the current political climate, SRCD is at a critical juncture in its organizational history. Deborah Johnson and Eleanor Seaton will host a professional development workshop in a Town Hall format that aims to chart a path forward for SRCD's role at the intersection of science and social policy. The session will create an open dialogue regarding SRCD's response to policies, such as the US family separation policy, as well as how SRCD proactively can use science to inform social policy. Integrative Statement: Home-based child care is the most widely used care arrangement and serves some of the most vulnerable populations including families with infants and toddlers, low incomes, and jobs that require them to work nontraditional hours. However, researchers have tended to design studies focused on child care centers, leaving the field with a smaller evidence base around home-based settings. As the importance of early childhood experiences has gained prominence, states are increasing their investment in promoting quality across early care and education settings through quality rating and improvement systems (QRIS). These systems increasingly include family child care programs. This context sets the stage for a panel that Amy Blasberg will moderate. She will start by grounding the conversation in a new conceptual model for understanding quality in home-based child care. Panelists will then respond to questions about promising practices to support quality in home-based settings, recent research on child outcomes in QRIS-rated family child care settings, and using policy as a lever for supporting home-based child care. Researchers will share 1) strategies from home visiting that could be applied to home-based child care settings, 2) strengths of family child care networks and how these systems can support providers in a variety of ways, and 3) results from a study in Georgia and a synthesis of QRIS validation studies conducted over the past several years. A federal policymaker will address policies that require homebased providers to meet certain standards and how states can continue to engage providers in the workforce.

Integrative Statement: Throughout the majority world, youth development programs are regarded as important resources for lifting young people out of poverty, enhancing their health, education, and vocational opportunities, and providing an impetus for their contributions to civil society. National and international governmental bodies (e.g., USAID, World Bank, UNICEF) and non-governmental organizations (including child-sponsorship organizations and private foundations) are joined by a common aspiration for enhancing the positive development of youth through designing and delivering effective programs. However, issues of theory, research design, and measurement limit the quality of the evaluation of youth development programs for majority world youth and constrain international comparisons that might afford general principles of program effectiveness. This roundtable brings together leaders from governmental and non-governmental organizations seeking to promote positive development among diverse majority-world youth. Integrative Statement: Students from economically disadvantaged backgrounds are at greater risk for low academic achievement, school day absences, and not completing high school (Duncan et al., 2010; Englund et al., 2008; Haveman, Wolfe, & Spaulding, 1991; Kearney & Levine, 2016). Interventions for at-risk students have demonstrated efficacy in improvements of academic and social-emotional outcomes, which require strategies fostering active participation, feelings of competence and motivation from children and their families (Boberiene, 2013; Durlak, et al., 2011; Garbacz et al., 2017 Shernoff, 2010). Family engagement in intervention services supports children's positive growth and academic achievement in prekindergarten-12th grade samples (Garbacz et al., 2017). Despite demonstrated effectiveness of family engagement in schools, consistent barriers are noted (Baker et al., 2016; Christenson, 2004; Esler et al., 2008). This workshop will be moderated by Morica Hutchisno to discuss strategies for bolstering family engagement in school-based programs and lead particpants in developing a draft logic model for their own program development efforts. The discussion of potential strategies and strengths and weaknesses is informed by qualitative and quantitative outcomes from 2 school-based Connecticut efforts. First, a local initative of K-8th graders serving a high-risk, diverse sample (n = 210), and second, state-wide K-12th grade initiative addressing academic enrichment and family engagement in low-income schools (n = 7,741). Attendees will discuss lessons learned and suggested best practices for family engagement in school-based programs. This will lead to the core workshop activity, where each attendee will craft a logic model for parent engagement program component tailored to their community.

Integrative Statement: The overall mission of the Institute of Education Sciences (IES) is to expand fundamental knowledge and understanding of education and to provide unbiased, reliable, and useful information to education leaders and practitioners, researchers, and the general public. IES supports rigorous and relevant research to improve education outcomes for all students, and particularly students whose educational experiences have been hindered because of their socioeconomic status, race/ethnicity, disability, limited English proficiency, and/or residential or school mobility. Through two Research Centers, the National Center for Education Research (NCER) and the National Center for Special Education Research (NCSER), IES funds grants for education and special education research that spans the early years to adulthood; predoctoral, postdoctoral, and early career training; statistics and methodology to support education research; evaluations of state and local education programs and policies; researcher-practitioner partnerships; research networks; and research and development centers. 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

Integrative Statement: In this talk, I will discuss the evolution of my thinking about intelligence. In the process, I will try to show how scientific thinking evolves over the course of a career, discarding or elaborating upon earlier ideas in favor of newer ones. I will discuss, in turn, the componential theory of intelligence, the triarchic theory of intelligence, the theory of successful intelligence, the augmented theory of successful intelligence, and the new theory of intelligence serving as a mental immune system. I will suggest that conventional views of intelligence have had a catastrophic effect on societies, resulting in the promotion of incompetent and often malign individuals into positions of leadership and authority, and leaving marginalized far more competent and benign people. Societies may not have much time to change their practices.

Rodríguez On June 21, 2017, the field of Latino child and family development lost one of its most influential and beloved scholars and mentors: Dr. John Raymond "Ray" Buriel. Ray Buriel's pioneering work initially examined developmental processes and everyday lived experiences among Mexican Americans and over time came to address similar processes and experiences among other immigrant populations. His

groundbreaking research on generational differences, acculturation, and language brokering continues to inform and influence research, policy, and best practices, particularly for immigrant communities. Another legacy of his professional life are the many undergraduate and graduate students he mentored during his four decades as a professor of Psychology and Chicana/o Studies at Pomona College. Panelists will highlight three conceptual areas in which Ray Buriel conducted seminal studies: (a) the academic experiences of children of immigrants; (b) the role of cultural values and acculturation in Mexican American and other immigrant communities; and (c) language brokering. Integrative Statement: In the last decade, psychological science has undergone a period of self correction beginning with the joint publications of implausible but empirical evidence for ESP (Bem, 2011) and a report by Simmons and colleagues which showed that hidden flexibility in common analytical strategies in psychological science could elevate false positive rates to 60% (2011). A powerful tool which has emerged to combat questionable research practices is preregistration: the public recording of study rationale, hypotheses, methods, and analysis plan. Preregistration shifts the incentive structure to value "good science" over "good results" (Chambers, 2017). To date, common preregistration templates have focused on laboratory based experimental manipulations which cannot be easily applied to ongoing longitudinal developmental studies with hypotheses that were established before preregistration was commonly available. This roundtable begins discussion around the unique challenges and opportunities afforded by the extension of preregistration to ongoing longitudinal studies, which are critical designs for understanding human development. This will involve the drafting of a new preregistration template, a key deliverable of the roundtable. Challenges to the extension of preregistration to mid-stage investigations include new grant proposals predicated upon existing study aims which cannot be modified, knowledge of prior measurement outcomes when considering future analyses which obscures traditional framing of exploratory vs confirmatory hypothesis framing, and many other issues about which it is crucial for developmental scientists to provide input. Four panelists from a diverse range of academic backgrounds and career stages will provide critical perspectives on preregistration during longitudinal developmental studies. Integrative Statement: This talk will describe two programs of research based on the idea that children's learning of mathematics in school can be enhanced by applying findings from cognitive science. One program of research focuses on the relation between spatial skill and mathematics, and asks whether teachers can leverage this connection instructionally. The second program of research focuses on children's understanding of place value, and asks whether mathematics learning can be improved by engaging basic cognitive processes such as categorization, labeling, and structure mapping. The talk will emphasize not only the potential benefits of cognitive science research for educational practice, but also ways that research may be shaped and improved through close collaboration with teachers.

Integrative Statement: During middle childhood, children are expected to show increasing cognitive sophistication in their executive functions, metacognition, and selfregulated learning (Flynn, Richert, Staiano, Wartella, & Calvert, 2014; Vanderventer & White). During this period they also are cited for their frequent engagement in the digital landscape (e.g., game design, game and mobile application play) in both recreational and educational settings (ESA, 2018; Project Tomorrow, 2016). However, examining exogenous factors that may influence cognitive development in middle childhood, such as children's increasing immersion in game and app play, remains relatively limited compared to investigations among late adolescents and adults (Blumberg, Altschuler, Almonte, & Mileaf, 2013). In this conversation roundtable, we will address the need for closing this empirical gap and to discuss advancements as based in the panelists' work. The panelists will highlight growing evidence that digital game design and play can positively influence youths' cognitive skills. The timeliness of working with youth in middle childhood is underscored by increasing evidence for the potential benefits of videogame play for enhancing both cognitive (Bavelier, Green, Pouget, & Schrater, 2012) and socioemotional (Granic, Lobel, & Engels, 2014) behaviors. Our goal is to encourage audience members to consider the value of examining the impact of digital game-based engagement on cognitive development in middle childhood. We will frame this discussion through multiple lenses, with research considering the developmental ramifications of game design, game features, children's cognitive abilities that impact how they play, and children's interaction with game characters during that play. Fran Blumberg will moderate this conversation.

Integrative Statement: Critical consciousness (CC; Freire, 1973) refers to awareness of oppressive systemic forces in society as well as a sense of collective or individual efficacy to work against oppression. CC consists of critical reflection (engagement in critical analysis of inequality), political efficacy (perceived capacity to effect change), and critical action (engagement in activities intended to effect change) (Watts, Diemer, & Voight, 2011). Developed in the field of literacy studies, CC has begun receiving attention in applied psychology as a resource that may foster thriving in people who are marginalized based on race, social class, or other factors. However, this attention has focused primarily on adults and adolescents (e.g., Diemer & Rapa, 2016; Hope & Bañales, 2018). This roundtable discussion brings together an interdisciplinary group of early career researchers to discuss emerging theory regarding the nature and development of CC in pre-adolescent children, as well as the potential psychological consequences of CC for children from diverse racial, economic, and geographic groups and at different points in development. The development and role of CC in educational settings will be emphasized. Key research questions and hypotheses will be explored through dialogue with the audience, facilitated by the moderator, Dr. Amy Heberle. This discussion will be of interest to those whose scholarship spans some of the following areas: youth civic engagement and empowerment; anti-bias and prejudice intervention work; the impacts of economic injustice on children; the impacts of racism and sexism on children's development; and how children thrive despite marginalization of various forms.

Integrative Statement: This session will highlight federal efforts to develop measurement tools to address research, policy, and practice needs for data collection in early childhood. Federal agencies collect data to conduct research on programs, for accountability and funding decisions, and for continuous quality improvement and needs assessment. The four proposed presentations will explore examples of federal measurement development initiatives designed to address needs in these areas at the classroom and program levels. The first presentation focuses on a measure developed by the Administration for Children and Families (ACF) to examine how early care and education (ECE) teachers collect data on children for use in instruction individualization: The Examining Data Informing Teaching measure (EDIT). The second presentation is on The Quality of Caregiver-Child Interaction for Infants and Toddlers measure (QCCIIT) which is the first measure of its kind, also developed by ACF, to examine ECE teacher-child interactions in infant and toddler center and home-based care settings. The third presentation introduces a measure designed to examine processes at the program level. The Assessing the Implementation and Cost of High Quality Early Care and Education (ECE-ICHQ) project is developing a tool to understand what a program does to support quality and the associated cost of administering those services. Finally, the Health Services Resource Administration (HSRA) will describe the development of the Home Visiting Budget Assistance Tool (HV-BAT). The HV-BAT is an instrument for gathering a standardized set of cost metrics across local home visiting programs, regardless of model or organizational setting.

Integrative Statement: Anthropologists have long investigated childhood around the world, contributing to an understanding of the plasticity and commonalities of human development. These efforts have recently gained momentum. In 2007 the Anthropology of Children and Youth Interest Group was founded as part of the American Anthropological Association, soon growing to 1200 members across 10 countries. This conversation roundtable, moderated by Cindy Dell Clark, will appraise and discuss the implications of recent anthropology for child research and theory. The session is presented for a dual audience: those new to the study of childhood within culture, as well as those already studying children in social contexts who want to take stock of the upsurge in the anthropology of childhood. Anthropology brings a methodological tradition steeped in up close and personal methods of inquiry, including participant observation, informant interviews, and archeological techniques. How do these traditions translate within today's anthropology of childhood? What methodological innovations have followed on the heels of the anthropology of childhood? What do these methods offer to the study of children overall? Anthropology also brings rich theoretical frameworks to the study of childhood, which are being translated by scholars for relevance to children and youth. What does the renaissance in the anthropology of childhood stand to contribute to theoretical conceptions of child rearing and child development? Viewing childhood through a culturally informed theoretical lens raises a plethora of implications for overall understandings of children's social development. This session is a chance to tap into a vibrant vein of recent scholarship.

Integrative Statement: Traditional conceptualizations of access to early care and education (ECE) focus on the availability of slots for young children and the price of care. Yet this narrow picture of access doesn't include other aspects of care that are important from a family's perspective and that shape the child's experience. A multidimensional definition of access developed by an expert workgoup includes other relevant concepts: "access means that parents, with reasonable effort and affordability, can enroll their child in an arrangement that supports the child's development and meets the parents' needs" (Friese et al., 2017). The purpose of this roundtable is to discuss and critique this proposed definition and to explore the opportunities and challenges the definition poses for researchers and policymakers focused on supporting young children's development in ECE settings. Katherine Paschall will be the Moderator for the roundtable and will pose questions about the research, policy and practice implications of the proposed access definition. Martha Zaslow will address the dimension of developmental support for children and the quality features necessary to promote young children's development. Rena Hallam will consider the system initiatives available to promote high quality care and their potential to facilitate meaningful quality improvements. Bentley Ponder will reflect on the policy implications of the dimension of reasonable effort and the work that states are doing on the dimension of meets the parents' needs. Integrative Statement: The Integrative Model (Garcia Coll et al., 1996) and PVEST (Spencer, 2006) argued that the United States was founded on stratification mechanisms linked to ethnicity/race, gender, and class. Racial discrimination is one such stratification mechanism, and includes dominant racial group members' actions that have differential and negative effects on subordinate ethnic/racial groups (Williams et al., 2003). Several metaanalyses have concluded that racial discrimination is negatively related to outcomes among minority adolescents (Benner et al., in press), minority youth and adults (Paradies et al., 2015), and African American youth and adults (Lee & Ahn, 2013). Given the plethora of research documenting the negative impact of racial discrimination experiences, it is time to take stock of the field and discuss future directions in developmental science. What are critical areas in racial discrimination research that developmental scientists should consider? The purpose of this roundtable is to discuss the next steps regarding racial discrimination research in developmental science among a diverse group of scholars. The participants include Margaret Hagerman (Mississippi State University), Virginia Huynh (California State University, Northridge), Eleanor Seaton (Arizona State University) and Adriana Umaña-Taylor (Harvard University). The participants bring unique interdisciplinary and methodological perspectives regarding the study of racial discrimination, utilizing diverse methodological approaches (e.g., quantitative, qualitative, mixed-methods) among diverse populations (e.g., African Americans, Asian Americans, Latinos, Whites). Eleanor Seaton will moderate the roundtable discussion. Integrative Statement: Hispanic children currently make up roughly one in four of all children in the United States and are projected to represent 1 in 3 children by. As a group, Hispanic children—the majority of whom are U.S. born—face some of the highest rates of poverty, with nearly two thirds living in or near poverty as compared to their non-Hispanic peers. How Hispanic children, especially those in low income households, fare will have an enormous impact on the future social and economic fabric of the United States. What we know suggests that while Hispanic children lag behind their counterparts in cognitive and academic skills during the early years, their social skills are at par or exceed those of their low-income counterparts. Moreover, compared to low-income African American children, low-income Hispanic children's cognitive and academic skills tend to experience steeper improvements with Hispanic children catching up to their African American peers. There is little information about how both protective and risk factors in the home environment as well as cultural factors, particularly during children's earliest years, contribute to the observed variability in racial/ethnic disparities in Hispanic children's developmental outcomes. What is understood is primarily through the lens of blackwhite differences among children. Drawing from a diverse interdisciplinary group of scholars, this roundtable, moderated by Dr. Lina Guzman, will describe existing research and theory on Hispanic children as well as gaps as well as mechanisms for dissemination and mentorship for early career scholars.

Integrative Statement: Moderator: Elizabeth Trejos-Castillo Prevention-intervention sciences continue to be puzzled by the need to culturally adapt interventions. On one hand, international initiatives have propelled a growing demand for evidence-based interventions (EBIs) particularly among countries with limited research capacity and resources where EBIs are adopted and disseminated by governmental and non-governmental organizations (NGOs), researchers and practitioners. On the other hand, the growing population diversity across countries and worldwide dissemination of knowledge presents the intervention science field with the need to adapt interventions by ensuring their effectiveness and scalability potential across contexts. Within the realm of global mental health issues, Toxic Stress effects on neurodevelopmental, cognitive, and socioemotional outcomes in children and adolescents warrants immediate consideration. That is, despite the attention that international governments have started to pay to toxic stress and its short and long-term effects on youth's developmental outcomes, emerging efforts are still lacking culturally appropriate interventions. Thus, a critical issue in advancing worldwide prevention and intervention efforts on the effects of toxic stress in children and adolescent's developmental outcomes is the need for culturally responsive practices. The proposed conversation roundtable brings together a group of international multidisciplinary experts in the areas of developmental, social and clinical psychology, neurodevelopment, psychiatry, intervention and prevention sciences, positive youth development, and at-risk populations. Experts will discuss insights on the critical juncture between cultural adaptation of interventions and research and practice in toxic stress, resilience, and positive development in

Integrative Statement: Determining the short- and longterm effects of early education (Head Start, PreK) on children at risk for low educational outcomes has been a central concern of researchers and policymakers for over 50 years. When positive outcomes are found to be lasting, the influences of children's experiences in early education and in the following primary grades (K-5) are not well understood. Hypotheses about how some early education efforts yield lasting effects while others do not, will be identified, including evidence-informed conceptions of children as learners and how those conceptions affect classroom learning opportunities and alignment of instruction. The demographic diversity of young children, specifically racial, ethnic, cultural, and linguistic, present challenges to current approaches to studying the influences of early education and how primary school learning opportunities are designed.

Integrative Statement: Increased calls for "evidence-based policymaking" have prompted scholars to want to make an impact with their work beyond the walls of academia. Unfortunately, many researchers are uncertain where to begin, and graduate programs often lack training in how to work at the intersection of research and policy. This workshop offers an introduction to best practices for connecting policy and research. It is geared toward graduate students and postdoctoral researchers and takes an educational approach (i.e. non-advocacy). Key questions addressed in this workshop include: What does it mean to work at the intersection of research and policy? How can I make my work policy-relevant? What can I do now that can set me up for future success in working at the intersection of research and policy? Participants are encouraged to bring

Integrative Statement: The cultural, linguistic, and racial/ethnic diversity of the United States student population continues to grow (National Center for Education Statistics [NCES], 2017a). This increase in diversity highlights the continued education achievement disparities between students of different groups (Snyder, de Bray, and Dillow, 2018). For example, in 2015, White students outperformed their Black and Latino peers in reading and math (NCES, 2017b; 2017c), and the 12th grade White-Black achievement gap in reading was larger than it was in 1992 (NCES, 2017b). In 2017, English Learners (ELs) underachieved compared to their non-EL peers in 4th, 8th, and 12th grades (NCES, 2018). One particular strategy for reducing disparities among marginalized cultural, linguistic, and racial/ethnic groups may be to educate students in ways that capitalize on cultural strength and provide teachers with strategies to support students from multiple backgrounds (APA Presidential Task Force on Educational Disparities, 2012). However, despite recognition of the potential for culturally-responsive classroom materials and teaching practices, many teachers report they are unprepared to instruct racial and ethnic minority students, or ELs (Banilower, Smith, Weiss, Malzahn, Campbell, & Weis, 2013). In this roundtable moderated by Rebecca McGill-Wilkinson, education researchers will discuss their work and experiences exploring, developing, and testing culturally-responsive practices and interventions to support the academic achievement of students from underrepresented groups. These researchers have worked with students from kindergarten through 12th grade, and





their teachers, and with students from multiple backgrounds including Black students and ELs.

While many boys and men do not actively support or perpetrate violence, sexual harassment, or other abuse, these compelling statistics implicate dominant masculine norms and patriarchal values that reinforce male entitlement, objectification of women, and power and violence. Furthermore, these events illuminate concerns about boys' development that have been cited for decades (e.g., suicide rates, risk taking, emotional health, and crime). In response, this Roundtable will take up the question of healthier masculine gender development and well-being with leading experts on bullying, sexual harassment and prevention/intervention science; race and gender stereotypes and Black boys' development; homophobic bullying and Gay-Straight Alliances in schools; and the social-emotional development of boys. The Roundtable will be moderated by Dr. Christopher Reigeluth, an expert on adolescent boys and gender policing. The Roundtable will conclude with a 30 minute period of discussion with the audience. While none of us can know how this important conversation might unfold, an overarching goal is to contribute to turning these recent and longstanding societal issues that implicate toxic masculinities into positive change in the interests of boys

Integrative Statement: Evaluations of large-scale, public pre-K programs have captured public and policy attention. They also provide rich territory for examining the potential benefits and risks associated with connecting scientific discoveries with applications aimed at improving human lives (SRCD Strategic Goal #2). This process of translation has involved networks of researchers, practitioners, policymakers, and communication experts in efforts to maximize the potential for pre-K programs and their evaluations to inform both knowledge about child development and pre-K improvement efforts. This conversation roundtable, moderated by Deborah Phillips, will assemble representatives from each of these groups who have been at the forefront of pre-K design, evaluation, and research translation efforts. The central question to be addressed is: What are the opportunities and challenges associated with designing and evaluating public pre-K programs to provide maximally valid and practical evidence for future pre-K research, practice, and policy? Integrative Statement: More than two decades of research-documents disparities in health and wellbeing for LGBTQ or sexual and gender minority (SGM) youth; research in the last decade has directly traced these disparities to experiences of discrimination and stress. Yet recent evidence from the developmental sciences points to paradoxical findings: in many cases there have been growing rather than shrinking health disparities. Integrative Statement: This conversation roundtable will bring together experts whose work focuses on increasing high quality Technology, Engineering and Math (STEM) education in ways that lend access to culturally and linguistically diverse learners. Rich STEM experiences are linked to beneficial outcomes across learning domains. Considering the cultural and linguistic diversity of students served by early childhood programs, it is imperative to build on all children's backgrounds and funds of knowledge to engage them in meaningful STEM experiences. Further, STEM's foundation in inquiry and experimentation provides a unique platform for learning that is authentic to the child's prior experience and that allows engagement independent of English proficiency or prior background. The panel represents a range of experts in early STEM learning





and culturally relevant practices in STEM education for diverse students and families. The panel includes: Dr. Gigliana Melzi, Associate Professor at Department of Applied Psychology and Affiliated Faculty at the Center for Latin American and Caribbean Studies, Dr. Margaret Caspe, Director of Research and Professional Learning at Global Family Research, Dr. Kimberly Brenneman, Program Officer for Education at the Heising-Simons Foundation, and Dr. Andres Bustamante, Assistant Professor in the School of Education at the University of California, Irvine. Integrative Statement: Much of what is known about parenting and child development is largely informed by research conducted in Western societies. As a result, theoretical frameworks are often developed based on findings in Western cultures. Although researchers are cognizant of the need to examine how these theories transcend cultural boundaries, this is often achieved using the etic approach, where local parenting practices are studied through "Western lenses". Important nuances in parenting behaviors are therefore missed when we study local parenting practices in non-Western countries. This Conversation Roundtable, moderated by Hoi Shan Cheung, addresses the challenges faced by researchers who conduct parenting research involving Asian populations. Recognizing that there is much variability even within Asia, the Roundtable brings together a panel of scholars who have conducted research involving parents and children from China, India, Japan and Singapore, representing several regions in Asia. Topics discussed include how parenting goals and practices may differ in and across Asia compared to the West, and how these differences translate into variations in children's developmental outcomes. The risks and challenges of incorporating "Western" concepts in Asian parenting research are also discussed, and a case will be made for the usefulness of indigenous parenting concepts in understanding the nuances of local parenting practices. The impact of globalization on Asian parenting

will be described in light of the increasing "westernization" of Asian societies. Methodological issues will also be examined, and participants are encouraged to share innovative research designs which they have adopted to help advance their understanding of Asian parenting.

Integrative Statement: Family engagement in children's early learning is one of the most powerful predictors of children's development, particularly in low-income families. When families provide enriched experiences, elaborated linguistic interactions, and learning opportunities, their children develop better socialemotional, language, and mathematical skills. These early experiences and continued parental support predict school readiness, later educational trajectories, and long-term academic success. By engaging families as partners early in the educational process, early childhood education (ECE) programs serve as gateways for parents to establish strong home-school connections to support their children's achievement. However, it can be challenging to gather meaningful data on family engagement strategies, especially regarding activities parents do at home to complement their children's learning in formal early childhood settings. In this session, Mallary Swartz, Director of Family Engagement Research at the Ounce of Prevention Fund, will moderate a discussion about diverse and innovative strategies for engaging families in their children's early learning and how to measure the effects of these strategies. While all projects take place with families in Head Start settings, each targets different outcome areas and uses different measures and methods (e.g., surveys, observations, interviews, focus groups) and implementation strategies. A dynamic discussion will inform researchers, practitioners, and policymakers about the relative benefits and challenges of varied approaches to measuring and implementing family engagement strategies and for promoting high-quality interactions among ECE staff,

families, and children that set children on a path toward

success.

Integrative Statement: There are approximately 7 million youth enrolled in structured mentoring relationships (MENTOR, 2014) and even more youth involved in unstructured or natural mentoring relationships (Beam, Chen, & Greenberger, 2002). The popularity of mentoring initiatives can be attributed to positive impacts found on youth academic, behavioral, and psychological outcomes (DuBois et al., 2010; Tolan et al., 2014). However, several evaluations have produced an inconsistent picture of the effectiveness of mentoring (DuBois, Holloway, Valentine, & Cooper, 2002; Wheeler, Keller & DuBois, 2010). This is because the impact of mentoring programs is tied to the quality of those programs. The quality of programs subsequently depends on the implementation of structures meant to engender safe and supportive relationships between mentors and mentees (Deutsch & Spencer, 2009). Given the complexity and popularity of mentoring interventions, this Conversation Roundtable brings together experts in mentoring interventions to discuss challenges faced, strategies used, successes achieved, and future directions for the field. Panelists have implemented both studied both structured and natural mentoring relationships with a variety of youth populations. Examples of challenges to be discussed are insufficient resources (e.g., human, financial), inadequate infrastructure (e.g., not strong or clear leadership), and limited knowledge, understanding, and expectations from stakeholders, volunteers, or community members. Integrative Statement: The ability to resist social influence is a skill that develops over time, with children and adolescents being more susceptible to social influence than adults. Much research on social influence has focused on the effects of peers; however, recent research has branched out to explore additional sources of social influence. In the last decade, research on peer influence has changed considerably with the development of new statistical approaches and methodologies, allowing for a greater understanding of how social influence occurs and what contributes to individual differences in social influence susceptibility. Whereas early social influence research relied heavily on self-reports (which are prone to biases and inherently limited by individuals' lack of selfawareness regarding their own susceptibility to influence), newer research has implemented creative approaches to overcoming these limitations. This roundtable brings together four scholars, each specializing in distinct





methodologies, to consider the unique challenges of studying social influence during childhood and adolescence. Performance-based methods, social network analysis, neuroimaging techniques, and dynamic modeling approaches will be discussed as possible solutions to common methodological challenges when examining social influence effects. This panel will debate how to handle bias, tease apart selection and socialization effects, deal with multiple social contexts and competing influences, as well as distinguish between multiple sources and types of influence. Finally, this panel will deliberate the future of social influence research and how to use these methods to explore social influence within new domains (including online and virtual social situations). Integrative Statement: Moderator: Dr. Robert Coplan, Carleton University, Canada Solitude is a normative human experience throughout the lifespan (Larson, 1990). However, despite its ubiquitous nature, being alone is often portrayed as a less than desirable state. The potential costs of solitude for well-being are underscored in contemporary psychological theories emphasizing affiliation with others as a basic human need (Baumeister & Leary, 1995), the developmental importance of peer relationships (Rubin et al., 2015), the mood-enhancing qualities of social interactions (Epley & Schroeder, 2014), and the damaging effects of Ioneliness (Hawkley & Cacioppo, 2010). There is also a long history of theoretical arguments espousing potential benefits of solitude (Merton, 1958; Winnicott, 1958), highlighting time alone as an important context for self-exploration (Goossens, 2014), creativity (Csikszentmihalyi, 1996), and self-renewal (Korpela & Staats, 2014). It has been argued that solitude is most likely to impart benefits when it is intrinsically motivated (Nguyen et al., 2018). However, surprisingly little empirical research has directly demonstrated the positive impacts of solitude (Coplan et al., 2018). This Roundtable will explore contemporary perspectives on potential benefits of solitude in childhood/adolescence. We will consider if, how, and under what circumstances, solitude can contribute to positive development, and examine how putative "causes" of solitary behaviors (e.g., shyness, unsociability) might be construed in a more positive light. Panelists are leading international experts who will face key questions pertaining

to areas of controversy. The Moderator will facilitate extensive discussion, draw attention to theoretical and applied issues, and urge participants to address implications for future research.

Research-Practice Partnerships within Comprehensive Community Initiatives: How-to (and how not-to-do) 12:30 pm - 2:00 pm

Comprehensive community initiatives (CCIs) are locally organized, multi-sector collaborations that build the capacity of a particular place to coordinate public resources, mobilize previously untapped family, cultural, and community-based resources, and design social interventions that lead to better population-level outcomes (Kubisch et al., 2011). Often, external researchers, whether at a local university or an independent research institution, provide the research infrastructure. This workshop is designed for researchers who want to learn how to create and/or optimize these research-practice partnerships. The workshop will be led by two research centers that have been involved in multiple CCI research-practice partnerships and can talk about promising practices - and practices to avoid. The workshop will offer an overview of CCIs and the tenets of research-practice partnerships, followed by role-play exercises that will surface the dynamics of learning and improvement that are unique to CCIs.

Attendees should leave the session with a clearer understanding of available resources for finding a postdoc, factors to consider when determining postdoc fit, and concrete strategies for optimizing the postdoc year(s).
