#### Thursday, March 21:

Research-Practice Partnerships within Comprehensive Community Initiatives: How-to (and how not-to-do) 12:30pm - 2:00pm

Comprehensive community initiatives (CCIs) are locally organized, multi-sector collaborations that build the capacity of a particular place to coordinate public resources, mobilize previously untapped family, cultural, and community-based resources, and design social interventions that lead to better population-level outcomes (Kubisch et al., 2011). Often, external researchers, whether at a local university or an independent research institution, provide the research infrastructure. This workshop is designed for researchers who want to learn how to create and/or optimize these research-practice partnerships. The workshop will be led by two research centers that have been involved in multiple CCI research-practice partnerships and can talk about promising practices - and practices to avoid. The workshop will offer an overview of CCIs and the tenets of research-practice partnerships, followed by role-play exercises that will surface the dynamics of learning and improvement that are unique to CCIs.

# SRCD Federal and State Policy Fellowships 2:45pm - 3:45pm

Meet with current and former SRCD Federal and State Policy Fellows to learn more about the goals of the fellowship program, the application process, and fellows' experiences. You will hear from postdoctoral and pre-doctoral fellows with placements in Congressional offices and federal and state agencies. Break-out roundtables will also facilitate discussion of the processes involved in promoting the translation of child development research into policy and practice.

## Rock the Postdoc: How to Find, Obtain, and Thrive in a Postdoctoral Position 4:00pm - 5:30pm

Should I pursue a postdoc? Where do I get one? How can I make the most of it? These are some guestions frequently encountered by graduate students as they approach the end of their doctoral training. Led by two postdoctoral researchers (Dr. Hannah Schacter and Dr. Adam Hoffman), this workshop brings together postdocs across multiple developmental disciplines to share their experiences in postdoctoral roles. During the workshop, we will a) review the postdoc search and application process, focusing on identifying funding mechanisms and determining a good fit b) consider the benefits (and drawbacks) of pursuing a postdoctoral position and c) discuss how to maximize a postdoc in preparation for the job market. Workshop panelists have successfully acquired postdoctoral positions through PI grants, institutional fellowships, as well as National Science Foundation and National Institutes of Health funding, and represent diverse areas of study, including but not limited to biobehavioral correlates of early life stress, cognitive and early home predictors of academic achievement, and adolescent identity development. The session is intended to generate an interactive discussion amongst audience members and panelists, with time dedicated to Q&A and collaborative activities. Attendees should leave the session with a clearer understanding of available resources for finding a postdoc, factors to consider when determining postdoc fit, and concrete strategies for optimizing the postdoc year(s). Attendees are encouraged to bring laptops or smartphones.
