# A Critical Quantitative measurement perspective: MIMIC models to identify and remediate racial & other biases

## **Session Description**

Sound measurement is foundational to quantitative methodology and developmental science. However, the racist history of quantitative methodology and measurement lead some to the conclusion that these approaches are irredeemable. Instead, acknowledging this history and repurposing quantitative methodology leads toward a more equitable, anti-racist, and critical quantitative perspective.

This workshop will explore measurement within two emergent perspectives: Quantitative Critical Race Theory (QuantCrit) and the Critical Quantitative (CritQuant) framework. We will emphasize CritQuant, which is anchored by five guiding principles (i.e., foundation, goals, parity, subjectivity, and self-reflexivity) to mitigate racism (and/or other systems of oppression) and advance social justice.

This meeting brings together researchers and practitioners whose work promotes well-being in children and families through contemplative practices (e.g., mindfulness, compassion, self-compassion). The goal is to engage a larger, more diverse, and global audience with this area of research and foster interest among the next generation of scholars. ## **Session Description**

Learn how to design and communicate research that is useful for policymakers. This policy-focused session honors Dr. Edward Zigler's legacy by featuring researchers and policymakers who use different models to successfully bridge the gap between developmental science and policy.

Receive practical insights to enhance engagement with the policymaking process, ensuring your work is relevant and impactful. This session is for all career and expertise stages. Panelists share projects that helped to inform policy decisions across broad child and family policy areas, including early care and education, child welfare, child health, and more.

A moderated discussion addresses keyways to align research with policymakers' needs, understanding policy timelines, and strategies for effective communication and dissemination. Raj Chetty, Harvard University

Children's chances of earning more than their parents have fallen from 90% to 50% over the past half century in America. This talk will show the central role that child development plays in driving these trends and in shaping economic opportunity more broadly. We will discuss a series of studies conducted by Opportunity Insights that use big data covering millions of people from sources ranging from anonymized tax records to Facebook social network data to understand the science of economic opportunity. The talk will analyze how and why children's chances of climbing the income ladder vary across the neighborhoods in which they grow up, examine the drivers of racial and gender disparities in economic mobility, and highlight the role of social capital as a key driver of upward mobility. The talk will conclude by discussing policy levers to increase upward mobility: reducing racial and economic segregation, transforming communities through place-based investments, and strengthening higher education programs. We will give examples of interventions in each of these domains that are shaping the design of policy and discuss directions for future interdisciplinary research that can help expand opportunities for all.



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
